

ACE-WIL BC/YUKON CO-OP STUDENT OF THE YEAR AWARDS NOMINATION GUIDELINES FORM A

ACE-WIL BC/Yukon is looking to recognize students that participated in co-operative education (Co-op) and you can help! The two awards recognize: a college and a university student participating in co-operative education. Each of the two winning students, their institutions, and partner organizations will receive provincial recognition, as a result of these awards. Each winning student will receive a \$500 cash award.

An ACE-WIL BC/Yukon institutional member may nominate **one (1) candidate** with the support of the host organization/employer and approval of the student. All nomination materials become the property of ACE-WIL BC/Yukon to be used in promoting co-operative education. Each winning student may be required to provide their Social Insurance Number once announced.

ELIGIBILITY:

- A. Undergraduate, diploma, or postgraduate student registered in a recognized post-secondary co-operative education program at an ACE-WIL BC/Yukon Member institution throughout the period from January December 2023.
 Secondary school students are not eligible for this award.
- B. Student must be nominated by an ACE-WIL BC/Yukon institution member with support of the host organization/employer. An ACE-WIL BC/Yukon institution member may nominate no more than one (1) candidate per award.
- C. Each nomination must focus on one Co-op experience in 2023, even if the student participated in more than one. Candidates may not be nominated twice in two consecutive years for a co-operative education experience that spans two calendar years. The co-operative education must meet the CEWIL WIL Definition found <a href="https://example.com/here-nteg-align: representation-new-nteg-align: representa

SELECTION CRITERIA:

The ACE-WIL BC/Yukon Student of the Year Awards Committee evaluates candidates on their impact to the three main stakeholders of co-operative education. Each criterion carries 1/3 of the overall score, out of 90 (Rubric attached). Subsequent review within the committee of the merits of top candidates (based on initial scores) helps to determine the winners.

- 1. (30 pts) impact on partner organization
- 2. (30 pts) impact on student (self)
- 3. (30 pts) impact on institution

Further information about what the committee is looking for is described below.

NOMINATIONS:

Nomination MUST be submitted in one (1) PDF electronic document titled by the Award Category, Student's Surname, First Name and Institution. (Example: Co-op, Brooks, Samantha, University College of BC. pdf) with the following items presented in the order below.

- 1. Nomination form (fillable PDF, completed and signed)
- 2. Organization/Employer Support form (fillable PDF, completed and signed)
- 3. Bio of their nominee (a maximum 150 words) to be used in ACE-WIL BC/Yukon communications
- 4. Student's 2-page essay on the benefits of Co-op
- 5. Student's portfolio (optional, two (2) pages maximum)
- 6. Student's current unofficial transcript

All applications must follow the current year's application process. Incomplete or improperly prepared nominations will be disqualified by ACE-WIL BC/Yukon. To avoid this happening, we recommend that you submit your nomination well in advance of the deadline, so that the ACE-WIL BC/Yukon committee can try to alert you if something is missing.

ACE-WIL BC/YUKON CO-OP STUDENT OF THE YEAR AWARDS GUIDELINES FOR NOMINATION MATERIALS FORM A

These guidelines are meant to assist institutions in choosing award nominees and preparing the nomination package. Packages that do not meet the guidelines may be removed from consideration. The committee is seeking well-rounded candidates who show evidence of achievement in all facets of co-operative education (Co-op).

NOMINATION FORM - INSTITUTION MEMBER

There are good reasons why you are choosing to nominate your student and we are interested in learning about them! By filling out the nomination form, we will learn your insights on the following factors:

- How the 2023 Co-op experience impacted the student did they show evidence of learning through their work terms by producing topnotch assignments or making decisions based on their experiences (e.g., changing education plans, making new employment leads); have they shown an ability to articulate the relevance between their Co-op experience, their study, and their career goals; have they shown an improved ability to navigate job search or other aspects of the professional working world; did they show extraordinary commitment to participating in Co-op?
- How the student impacted their educational institution How have they helped promote Co-op to peers or academic units; have they helped other students with Co-op issues like whether to participate or how to succeed; have they created new Co-op opportunities for themselves or others; have they used workplace learning or professional connections to enrich learning back on campus? Some examples include: students developing new Co-op opportunities, being a peer helper, volunteering at mock interview sessions, sharing their Co-op experience in institutional promotions or events, inviting a member from their partner organization to academic initiatives like a course discussion and connecting faculty researchers with industry researchers.

HOST ORGANIZATION/EMPLOYER SUPPORT FORM

The Awards Committee is also interested in the partner organization/employer perspective; how did the student impact their workplace/partner organization (in 2023 only) – did they achieve something extraordinary; were they chosen or invited to represent the organization on research or other public domains, did they show evidence of bringing the best of themselves and their academic programs?

Through this form, we are looking for the following factors:

- The student's duties/responsibilities in 2023;
- The student's impact to the organization did they bring ideas from their academics?
- Outstanding work achievements (e.g., cost savings, process/quality improvements, design/development innovations, improved customer service, significant research or other initiatives etc.); and
- Extra duties or opportunities that were assigned because the student performed above expectations
 *If the partner organization prefers, a letter (max. 2 pages on letterhead) may be submitted instead of the support form.
 The letter must include all information requested on the form, including the permission statement and a signature and date.

NOMINEE BIO

The nomination package must include a bio of the nominee (a maximum 150 words) to be used in ACE-WIL BC/Yukon communications.

STUDENT NOMINEE

Nominated students are required to prepare and submit:

- 1. An essay on the benefits of co-operative education (two (2) pages maximum, 1-inch margins, 10-point font). The essay should be contextualized in the student's experience and could include topics like:
 - Reasons why you participated in Co-op and why you are happy you did:
 - How Co-op has enhanced your personal, academic, and career development.
- 2. Students may also include up to 2 pages of additional items (Portfolio) they feel will give the selection committee a better idea of how co-operative education is important to them and how it has impacted them, their workplace (partner organization), and/or their school. Portfolios may include things like photos, articles, excerpts from research work, and letters of recommendation. Creativity is encouraged. Please note that additional documents similar to those already in the nomination package will not be considered.



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Please complete all sections of this nomination form including signatures. Any false information provided in a nomination may result in disqualification or retraction of the award.

Only **ACE-WIL BC/Yukon members** may submit a nomination. ACE-WIL BC/Yukon educational institutions must have support of a host organization/employer, as shown by the completed Organization/Employer Support Form. If you are not an ACE-WIL BC/Yukon member, please have someone from your institution who is, sign and submit the nomination.

| Student Nominee's portfolio (optional, two (2) pages maximum)

- 1. (30 pts) impact on partner organization
- 2. (30 pts) impact on student (self)
- 3. (30 pts) impact on institution

Impact on Institution	 A. Ambassador of institution/promoter of co-operative education. B. Mentor/help other Co-op students. C. Recruit/create new Co-op opportunities. D.
